1. COVID-19 Response Review and Discussion (ACTION ITEM) - Gary J. Riedner

Residents and businesses of the City of Moscow continue to comply with Governor Brad Little's Order to Self-Isolate through April 30, 2020, issued by Idaho Department of Health and Welfare Director Dave Jeppeson as amended on April 15, 2020, and the Public Health Emergency Orders 20-01 and 20-02, issued by Mayor Bill Lambert and extended to May 5, 2020 by the Moscow City Council through Resolutions 2020-06 and 2020-07.

On April 23, 2020, Governor Little held a press conference and issued his "Idaho Rebounds Guidelines for Opening Up Idaho", which describes the current stage of the State's COVID-19 response, referencing the current Order to Self-Isolate. The plan then describes four distinct stages which provide a protocol for opening the economy for the state. Each stage is dependent upon the criteria of the previous stage being met, and sets targets for reopening and/or regulation of different types of activities in order to provide a return to economic activities, while protecting the public from the spread of COVID-19. Each stage of the plan will be re-evaluated every two weeks "against criteria to determine feasibility to advance from one stage to the next". The plan also states that the dates are estimated targets.

The City of Moscow's Public Health Emergency Orders are in place until expiration on May 5, 2020, unless modified, extended or terminated by the City Council through adoption of a Resolution to that effect. At the time the Mayor issued Public Health Emergency Orders 20-01 and 20-02, and those Orders were extended by the Moscow City Council through Resolutions 2020-06 and 2020-07, the Governor had not issued the Order to Self-Isolate, which was issued on March 25, 2020, and was effective until 11:59 pm on April 15, 2020, unless extended or modified. On April 15, 2020, the Order to Self-Isolate was extended until 11:59 pm on April 30. Stage 1 of the Governor's Idaho Rebounds Guidelines for Opening Up Idaho starts on May 1,

2020 and Stage 4 is expected to complete on June 26, 2020.

In light of the issuance by Governor Little of the Idaho Rebounds plan, the City Council may elect to review and modify, terminate or extend its current Resolutions 2020-06 and 2020-07.

PROPOSED ACTIONS: Review Governor Little's Rebound Idaho plan and determine whether to modify, extend, or terminate Resolutions 2020-06 and 2020-07; or to leave such Resolutions to expire on May 5, 2020; or take such other action deemed appropriate.

2. Update on City Operations Due to COVID-19 Response (ACTION ITEM) - Gary J. Riedner

City Staff will discuss preliminary plans and updates relating to continuity of City operations as a result of Governor Little's Rebound Idaho plan and City Council direction regarding its Resolutions 2020-06 and 2020-07, extending Mayor Lambert's Public Health Emergency Orders 20-01 and 20-02.

GUIDELINES FOR OPENING UP IDAHO

Governor Brad Little, with the help of the Department of Health and Welfare and guidance issued by President Donald Trump and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, has established a data-driven approach to opening up Idaho's economy. This approach reduces the risk of COVID-19 to Idaho's most vulnerable population and preserves capacity in our healthcare system, while opening up businesses safely. From an economic standpoint, Idaho's rebound from COVID-19 starts with employee and consumer confidence, which leads into business stability and growth and eventually promotion and attraction.

MEETING IDAHO CRITERIA MEANS ADVANCING TO A STAGED APPROACH

All criteria below must be met before Idaho advances to the next stage of reopening. The Idaho Division of Public Health and the Governor's Coronavirus Working Group will review the criteria every two weeks to assess if criteria are met, or continue to be met, so Idaho can move to the next stage. **To advance to the next stage, all criteria must be met. If the criteria indicates trends are beginning to move the wrong direction, or there is evidence that a stage has adversely impacted rates, stages may have to be extended or reversed.** Dates shown in the document are estimated timelines only.

IDAHO CRITERIA

SYNDROMIC

Downward trend or low numbers of COVID-19-like illness patient visits as tracked by Emergency Departments within a 14-day period

MEASURED BY: NSSP (Idaho's syndromic tracking system). Displayed on website as "Number of Emergency Department Visits for COVID-Like Illness."

METRIC: Downward trend over most recent reported 14-day period, OR less than 20 visits/day on average over same 14-day period

AND

Downward trend or very low numbers of patients with COVID-19-like illness admitted from Emergency Departments within a 14-day period

MEASURED BY: NSSP (Idaho's syndromic tracking system). Displayed on website as "Number of emergency Department Patients with COVID-like Illness Symptoms Admitted to the Hospital."

METRIC: Downward trend over most recent reported 14-day period, OR less than 2 patients/day on average over same 14-day period

EPIDEMIOLOGIC

Downward trend or low levels of documented COVID-19 cases reported within a 14-day period

MEASURED BY: NBS (Idaho's integrated disease reporting system). Displayed on the website as "COVID-19 by Date Reported."

METRIC: Downward trend over most recent reported 14-day period, OR less than 20 patients per day on average reported statewide over the same 14-day period

OR

Downward trend of positive COVID-19 PCR tests as a percent of total tests within a 14-day period (including flat or increasing volume of tests)

MEASURED BY: NBS (Idaho's integrated disease reporting system). Will be displayed on the website

METRIC: Downward trend over most recent reported 14-day period, OR less than 5 percent laboratory PCR positivity on average over same 14-day period

HEALTHCARE

Treat all patients without needing to use crisis standards of care

MEASURED BY: Governor's Order for Crisis Standards of Care in place; reports from hospitals

AND

Available ventilators, intensive care unit beds, and personal protective equipment (PPE) to safely care for additional COVID-19 patients in hospitals

MEASURED BY: Idaho Resource Tracking System (IRTS) (through the Division of Public Health) and displayed on the website

METRIC: At least 50 available (unused) ventilators, 50 ICU beds, and available 10-day supply of N95 masks, surgical masks, face shields, gowns, and gloves

AND

Robust COVID-19 testing program in place for at-risk healthcare workers

MEASURED BY: NBS (Idaho's integrated disease reporting system). Numbers of reported cases among healthcare workers; will be displayed on the website

METRIC: Downward trend over most recent reported 14-day period, OR less than 2 healthcare workers reported/day on average over same 14-day period



STRATEGIES, RESPONSIBILITIES, AND CAPABILITIES NEEDED

The State of Idaho must remain focused on achieving the following core preparedness responsibilities.

TESTING AND CONTACT TRACING:

- Ability to quickly set up safe and efficient screening and testing sites for symptomatic individuals, including those with mild symptoms
- Contact tracing in place for all COVID-19 positive results
- Screening and testing locations in all regions of the state in place that serve older individuals, rural and lower income populations, and racial and ethnic minorities, such as Native Americans and Hispanics

PLANS AND STRATEGIES:

- State and local preparedness plans are in place including surge plans
- Crisis Standards of Care Plan established
- Long-Term Care Task Force operational to support long-term care facilities
- Testing strategy developed
- Contact tracing strategy developed

HEALTHCARE SYSTEM CAPACITY:

- Ability to quickly supply sufficient PPE, medications, and critical medical equipment to handle dramatic surge if needed
- Ability to quickly test symptomatic healthcare workers
- Ability to surge intensive care unit capacity

STAGED OPENING (AFTER IDAHO CRITERIA IS MET)

Until we have targeted, case-based interventions for each infectious person, an effective vaccine, or effective treatment, we must maintain some level of community interventions to slow the spread of COVID-19. This includes heightened protections for the health and safety of workers in critical industries, people living and working in high-risk facilities (e.g. senior care facilities), and all other employees.

All Idahoans have a responsibility to protect themselves and others. Each stage, while allowing for additional businesses and practices to open and loosen, is grounded in the following basic practices for individuals and businesses:

PROTOCOLS

ALL STAGES – INDIVIDUALS SHOULD CONTINUE TO:

- Engage in physical distancing of at least six feet
- Wear face coverings in public places
- Stay home if sick
- Practice good hand hygiene
- Cover coughs and sneezes
- Disinfect surfaces and objects regularly

ADDITIONAL PROTOCOLS WILL BE PROVIDED FOR EACH STAGE.

ALL STAGES – EMPLOYERS SHOULD CONTINUE TO:

- Maintain the six-foot physical distancing requirements for employees and patrons
- Provide adequate sanitation and personal hygiene for employees, vendors, and patrons
- Ensure frequent disinfection of the business as well as regular cleaning, especially of high-touch surfaces
- Identify how personal use items such as masks, face coverings, and gloves may be required by employees, vendors, and/or patrons
- Provide services while limiting close interactions with patrons
- Identify strategies for addressing ill employees, which should include requiring COVID-19 positive employees to stay at home while infectious, and may include keeping employees who were directly exposed to the COVID-19 positive employee away from the workplace, and the closure of the business until the location can be properly disinfected
- On a case-by-case basis, include other practices appropriate for specific types of businesses such as screening of employees for illness and exposures upon work entry, requiring non-cash transactions, etc.



CURRENT STAGE

existing Order through April 30

INDIVIDUAL

- **All Idahoans, including vulnerable Idahoans,** continue to self-quarantine, except for certain essential activities and work to provide essential business and government services or perform essential public infrastructure
- **Gatherings** of individuals outside the home are prohibited
- Prohibit non-essential **travel** and adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following essential travel
- Unless on essential business, people entering Idaho are required to **self-quarantine for 14 days**. If a person is in Idaho for less than 14 days, they must self-quarantine for the duration of their visit

EMPLOYER

See “Specific Types of Employers” in the right column for places of worship, restaurants, bars, gyms, daycares, senior living facilities, and salons

- Continue to encourage **telework**, whenever possible and feasible with business operations
- **Employees** who are considered vulnerable individuals should continue to self-quarantine. Special accommodations for these employees should be made in the workplace if they are unable to work from home
- **Non-essential businesses**, other than those excluded in the amended order, develop plans for reopening and ability to meet business protocols
- Non-essential **travel** prohibited

SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS

- Visits to **senior living facilities and congregate facilities (e.g. jails and corrections)** are prohibited and those employees and providers who do interact with residents and patients must adhere to strict protocols regarding hygiene and infection prevention
- **Bars and nightclubs** are closed
- **Restaurants** continue with takeout and delivery.
- **Places of worship** develop plans for reopening and ability to meet protocols
- **Indoor gyms** and recreation facilities are closed
- **Hair salons** are closed
- **Large venues** (e.g. movie theaters and sporting venues) are closed
- **Daycare**, if closed, develop plans for reopening to meet business protocols and work with local public health districts and DHW

Every two weeks: re-evaluation against criteria to determine feasibility to advance from one stage to the next.

***ALL CRITERIA MUST BE MET TO MOVE TO THE NEXT STAGE AND DATES ARE ESTIMATED TARGETS



STAGE 1

After all criteria are met
May 1 – May 15***

INDIVIDUAL

- **All vulnerable Idahoans** should continue to self-quarantine. Members of households with vulnerable residents should be aware that by returning to work or other environments where distancing is not always possible, they could carry the virus back home. Precautions should be taken to isolate from vulnerable residents
- **Gatherings**, both public and private, should be avoided
- Minimize non-essential **travel** and adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel
- Continue the **14-day self-quarantine** for people entering Idaho to prevent influx of out-of-state visitors

EMPLOYER

See “Specific Types of Employers” in the right column for places of worship, restaurants, bars, gyms, daycares, senior living facilities, and salons

- Continue to encourage **telework**, whenever possible and feasible with business operations

Return employees to work in phases, if physical distancing, personal protections and sanitation are feasible

- **Employees** who are considered vulnerable individuals should continue to self-quarantine. Special accommodations for these employees should be made in the workplace if they are unable to work from home
- **Non-essential businesses**, other than those excluded in the amended order implement plans for reopening demonstrating ability to meet business protocols
- Minimize non-essential **travel** and adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel

SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS

- Visits to **senior living facilities and congregate facilities (e.g. jails and corrections)** are prohibited and those employees and providers who do interact with residents and patients must adhere to strict protocols regarding hygiene and infection prevention
- **Bars and nightclubs** remain closed
- **Restaurants** dining rooms remain closed, develop plans for reopening and ability to meet business protocols in order to open in stage 2
- **Places of worship** can open if they adhere to strict physical distancing, sanitation protocol, and any CDC guidance
- **Indoor gyms** and recreation facilities remain closed, develop plans for reopening and ability to meet business protocols in order to open in stage 2
- **Hair salons** remain closed, develop plans for reopening and ability to meet business protocols in order to open in stage 2
- **Large venues** (e.g. movie theaters and sporting venues) are closed
- **Daycares** and organized youth activities and camps can reopen

Every two weeks: re-evaluation against criteria to determine feasibility to advance from one stage to the next.

***ALL CRITERIA MUST BE MET TO MOVE TO THE NEXT STAGE AND DATES ARE ESTIMATED TARGETS



STAGE 2

If no significant increase in cases and criteria remain met
May 16 – May 29***

INDIVIDUAL

- **All vulnerable Idahoans** should continue to self-quarantine. Members of households with vulnerable residents should be aware that by returning to work or other environments where distancing is not always possible, they could carry the virus back home. Precautions should be taken to isolate from vulnerable residents
- **Gatherings**, both public and private, of less than 10 people, where appropriate physical distancing and precautionary measures are observed can occur.
- Minimize non-essential **travel** and adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel
- Continue the **14-day self-quarantine** for people entering Idaho to prevent influx of out-of-state visitors

SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS

- Visits to **senior living facilities and congregate facilities (e.g. jails and corrections)** are prohibited and those employees and providers who do interact with residents and patients must adhere to strict protocols regarding hygiene and infection prevention
- **Bars and nightclubs** remain closed
- **Restaurant dining rooms** can open once their plans have been submitted for approval by local public health districts
- **Indoor gyms** and recreation facilities can open if ability to meet business protocols
- **Hair salons** can open if ability to meet business protocols
- **Large venues** (e.g. movie theaters and sporting venues) are closed

EMPLOYER

See “Specific Types of Employers” in the right column for places of worship, restaurants, bars, gyms, daycares, senior living facilities, and salons

- Continue to encourage **telework**, whenever possible and feasible with business operations

Return employees to work in phases, if physical distancing, personal protections and sanitation are feasible

- **Employees** who are considered vulnerable individuals should continue to self-quarantine. Special accommodations for these employees should be made in the workplace if they are unable to work from home
- All open **businesses** continue to follow plans.
- Minimize non-essential **travel** and adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel

Every two weeks: re-evaluation against criteria to determine feasibility to advance from one stage to the next.

STAGE 3

If no significant increase in cases and criteria remain met
May 30 – June 12th***

INDIVIDUAL

- **Vulnerable Idahoans** can resume public interactions, but should practice physical distancing, minimizing exposure to social settings where distancing may not be practical, unless precautionary measures are observed
- **Gatherings**, both public and private, of 10-50 people, where appropriate physical distancing and precautionary measures are observed can occur
- Non-essential **travel** can resume to locations that allow it and do not have ongoing transmission (adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel)
- Discontinue the **14-day self-quarantine** for people entering Idaho

SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS

- Visits to **senior living facilities and congregate facilities (e.g. jails and corrections)** are prohibited and those employees and providers who do interact with residents and patients must adhere to strict protocols regarding hygiene and infection prevention
- **Bars and nightclubs** remain closed, develop plans for operating with diminished standing room occupancy in order to open in stage 4
- **Large venues** (e.g. movie theaters and sporting venues) remain closed, develop plans for operating with limited physical distancing protocols in order to open in stage 4

EMPLOYER

See "Specific Types of Employers" in the right column for places of worship, restaurants, bars, gyms, daycares, senior living facilities, and salons

- Continue to encourage **telework**, whenever possible and feasible with business operations

Return employees to work in phases, if physical distancing, personal protections and sanitation are feasible

- **Employees** who are considered vulnerable individuals should continue to self-quarantine. Special accommodations for these employees should be made in the workplace if they are unable to work from home
- All open **businesses** continue to follow plans
- Non-essential **travel** can resume to locations that allow it and do not have ongoing transmission (adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel)

Every two weeks: re-evaluation against criteria to determine feasibility to advance from one stage to the next.

If no significant increase in cases and criteria remain met
June 13 – June 26***

INDIVIDUAL

- **Vulnerable Idahoans** can resume public interactions, but should practice physical distancing, minimizing exposure to social settings where distancing may not be practical, unless precautionary measures are observed
- **Gatherings**, both public and private, of more than 50 people, where appropriate physical distancing and precautionary measures are observed can occur
- Non-essential **travel** continues to locations that allow it and do not have ongoing transmission (adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel)

SPECIFIC TYPES OF EMPLOYERS

- Visits to **senior living facilities and congregate facilities (e.g. jails and corrections)** can resume. Those who interact with residents and patients must be diligent regarding hygiene and physical distancing
- **Bars and nightclubs** may operate with diminished standing-room occupancy, where applicable and appropriate
- **Large venues** (e.g. movie theaters and sporting venues) can operate under limited physical distancing protocols

EMPLOYER

See “Specific Types of Employers” in the right column for places of worship, restaurants, bars, gyms, daycares, senior living facilities, and salons

- Resume unrestricted staffing of worksites, but continue to practice physical distancing, personal protections and sanitation for protection of workers
- Special accommodations for **employees** who are considered vulnerable should be made in the workplace
- All open **businesses** continue to follow plans
- Non-essential **travel** continues to locations that allow it and do not have ongoing transmission (adhere to [CDC guidelines](#) regarding isolation following travel)

Every two weeks: re-evaluation against criteria to determine feasibility to advance from one stage to the next.

GUIDANCE FOR GOVERNOR BRAD LITTLE'S AMENDED STATEWIDE STAY-HOME ORDER

Order Updated on April 15, 2020 | Effective through April 30, 2020

Facilities & services can open for curbside & delivery

Any facility or service (including formerly "non-essential" businesses) can begin to operate via curbside services, drive-in, drive-through pickup, mailed services or delivery services.

Must remain closed: indoor gyms, recreational facilities, nightclubs, bars, entertainment venues, convention centers, hair and nail salons, public events and gatherings, dine-in restaurants (drive-thru, carry-out, delivery to continue), and other facilities and services not included in "essential" businesses as defined in order.

Out-of-state travelers limited

Non-residents must self-quarantine in Idaho for 14 days after coming into the state.

Does not apply to those performing essential services or those who live in one state and work or gain essential services in another state.

Continue to self-isolate

ALL residents of Idaho must self-isolate and stay and work from home as much as possible, unless you work in healthcare, public safety or an identified "essential business" as defined in order.

Residents can leave homes to obtain or provide essential services. People at higher risk (over 65 and/or health-compromised) should avoid leaving their homes.

Employers that do not provide essential services as defined in order must take all steps necessary for employees to work remotely from home.

Ramp up personal hygiene

Practices social distancing, wash hands, don't touch your face, clean high touch surfaces, cover coughs and sneezes, and do not shake hands. Wear protective face coverings in public places and gloves as necessary.

"Essential" facilities & services still open

Grocery stores, healthcare facilities, gas stations, pharmacies, essential state and local government functions, laundromats/laundry services, financial institutions, residential and home-based care, veterinary services, hardware stores, limited child care for essential workers, infrastructure, and other businesses essential to the safety and well-being of the residents as defined in the order remain open. Restaurants open but only for drive-thru, carry-out, or delivery.

Limit public transit & travel

Only to provide or obtain essential services. Idaho residents continue to cease all non-essential travel.

No gatherings

Limit all non-essential gatherings of any number of individuals outside the household.

Outdoor activity OK

Outdoor activity is not prohibited but residents should keep distance of 6-feet from others not in their household.

Amended Order in effect through April 30, 2020.

Governor Little and public health officials will reassess before April 30, 2020.

Final Amended Statewide Stay-Home Order available at coronavirus.idaho.gov

After April 30, 2020

Governor Little also said “non-essential” businesses should prepare to reopen after April 30 as long as they prepare operational plans over the next two weeks to:

- maintain social distancing for staff and patrons
- provide adequate sanitation and protective coverings for employees, vendors, and patrons
- offer curbside and pickup delivery
- limit number of people in business at a time
- direct flow of people in the operation

Criteria for opening will be posted to coronavirus.idaho.gov when completed.

This excludes some “non-essential” businesses where people simply cannot safely social distance, such as nightclubs, bars, and restaurants for dine-in; indoor gyms and recreational facilities; hair and nail salons; convention and entertainment centers; and public events and gatherings.

He noted that may not occur if there is an upward trend of severe COVID-19 cases in Idaho between now and April 30.

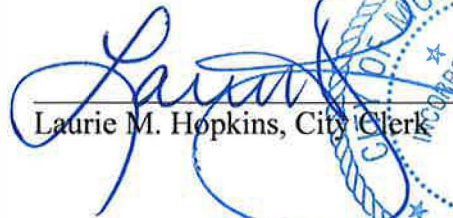

MASS GATHERINGS, RESTAURANTS AND BARS

March 20, 2020

WHEREAS, COVID-19, is a respiratory disease caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus, which is a new strain of coronavirus that had not been previously identified in humans and can easily spread from person to person, which can result in serious illness or death thereby threatening widespread and/or severe damage to life or property thereby creating an "emergency" as defined by Idaho Code § 46-1002; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Health and Human Services Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") identifies the potential public health threat posed by COVID-19 both globally and in the United State as "high", and has advised that person-to-person spread of COVID-19 will continue to occur globally, including within the United States; and

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the International Health Regulations Emergency Committee of the World Health Organization declared the outbreak a "public health emergency of international concern"; and

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2020, Health and Human Services Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a public health emergency for the United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on February 29, 2020, Washington Governor Jay Inslee proclaimed a State of Emergency exists in all counties in the State of Washington; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, The World Health Organization (WHO) made the assessment that COVID-19 can be characterized as a pandemic; and

There shall be no on-

premises, whether inside or outside the establishment, food or drink consumption. However, the following is permitted:

- A. Curbside pick-up, take-out, and drive-through of food and/or drink service is permitted. Where possible, online (e.g., Venmo, Squarecash, Google Pay, ApplePay) and telephonic credit card transactions are strongly encouraged. Cash payments are strongly discouraged. Employees who handle cash or credit cards shall use cleansing methods between each transaction.
 - B. Delivery food and beverage service is permitted. Where possible online and telephonic credit card transactions are strongly encouraged. Cash payments are strongly discouraged. Employees who handle cash or credit cards shall use cleansing methods between each transaction.
 - C. Parking meter spaces, if any, in front of a food/beverage service establishment shall be reserved for the temporary use by individuals for curbside take-out.
 - D. All employees are strongly encouraged to wear protective clothing while preparing, delivering, or completing transactions.
3. **Restaurants.** All restaurants and dine-in food service within the city limits of the City of Moscow, as defined by I.C. 23-942 or I.C. 39-5502, whether inside or outside the establishment, are prohibited from serving on-site meals and beverages. Restaurants shall not admit members, guests, patrons or customers inside the establishment. However, the following is permitted:

Where possible, online (e.g., Venmo, Squarecash, Google Pay, ApplePay) and telephonic credit card transactions are strongly encouraged. Cash payments are strongly discouraged. Employees who handle cash or credit cards shall use cleansing methods between each transaction.
 - B. Delivery food and beverage service is permitted. Where possible online and telephonic credit card transactions are strongly encouraged. Cash payments are strongly discouraged. Employees who handle cash or credit cards shall use cleansing methods between each transaction.

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, pursuant to the authority granted under Idaho Code § 46-1011, Bill Lambert, Mayor of the City of Moscow, Idaho, proclaimed and declared a local disaster emergency in the City of Moscow, Latah County, Idaho due to the COVID-19 pandemic and authorized the furnishing of aid and assistance thereunder; and

WHEREAS, the declaration shall remain in effect for a period of seven (7) days, unless extended pursuant to consent of the Moscow City Council in accordance with Idaho Code § 46-1011(1); and

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary by the Council of the City of Moscow to extend such local disaster emergency declaration to provide for the ongoing threat to public life and property and the Council wishes to continue to be proactive and help reduce the spread of COVID-19 and to encourage our community members and community businesses to do their part to prevent and limit the spreading of this virus; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (hereinafter "CDC") has provided guidance for preventing the spread of COVID-19 and is continually providing updates as information becomes available with revised recommendations;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Moscow as follows:

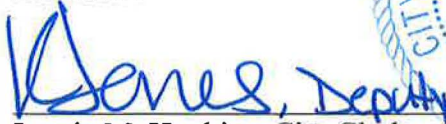

WHEREAS, the CDC identifies the potential public health threat posed by COVID-19 both globally and in the United State as "high", and has advised that person-to-person spread of COVID-19 will continue to occur globally, including within the United States; and

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the International Health Regulations Emergency Committee of the World Health Organization declared the outbreak a "public health emergency of international concern"; and

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2020, Health and Human Services Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a public health emergency for the United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on February 29, 2020, Washington Governor Jay Inslee proclaimed a State of Emergency exists in all counties in the State of Washington; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, The World Health Organization (WHO) made the assessment that COVID-19 can be characterized as a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, the City of Pullman Mayor, Glenn Johnson, declared a State of Emergency for the City of Pullman. The emergency declaration facilitates potential future assistance related to COVID-19 and is a means to ensure all necessary resources will be available if needed; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the Idaho Governor Brad Little declared a state of emergency due to COVID-19. State officials say more than 100 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Idaho, but no one has been positive for COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States issued an emergency declaration for the country in response to the increasing number of COVID-19 cases within the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and the Idaho North Central Health District issued recommendations for mass gatherings and public events in order to contain and slow the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, a local disaster emergency may be declared by the Mayor within a political subdivision, pursuant to Idaho Code § 46-1011 and other relevant sections of Idaho Code; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Idaho Code, the effect of such declaration is to activate the recovery aspects of any and all applicable local or intergovernmental disaster emergency plans and to authorize the furnishing of aid and assistance thereunder; and

WHEREAS, the City may pass all ordinances and make all regulations necessary to preserve the public health; prevent the introduction of contagious diseases into the city; make quarantine laws for that purpose and enforce the same within five (5) miles of the City, pursuant to Idaho Code §50-304; and

WHEREAS, the City of Moscow desires to take action in order to be proactive and help reduce the spread of this virus and encourages our community members and community businesses to do their part to prevent and limit the spreading of this virus;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Lambert, Mayor of the City of Moscow, Idaho, do hereby proclaim and declare a local disaster emergency in the City of Moscow, Latah County, Idaho. All City departments are directed to utilize City resources as follows:

1. To do everything reasonably possible to assist affected individuals and entities in an effort to respond to and recover from the outbreak.
2. To follow the recommendation of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and that of Public Health-Idaho North Central District by postponing or canceling all City sponsored events meeting the following criteria:
 - a. The event will draw audiences or participants from communities, states, or countries with confirmed community spread of COVID-19 disease.
 - b. The event will be held indoors and bring together more than 250 individuals where social distancing of 6 feet or more is unlikely or not possible.
 - c. The event's primary audience includes or may expose high-risk populations, including adults over the age of 60 years and people with underlying chronic medical conditions like heart or lung disease or diabetes, regardless of the number of attendees.

3. To take immediate action and other reasonably necessary steps to prevent and limit the spreading of COVID-19, including, but not limited to activation of the City of Moscow Pandemic Influenza Preparedness Plan, Disaster Management Plan Annex.

The City of Moscow recommends the Public follow the same recommendations of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and that of Public Health-Idaho North Central District by postponing or cancelling mass gatherings and public events that meet the criteria noted above.

This declaration shall remain in effect for a period of seven (7) days, unless extended pursuant to authorization of the Moscow City Council in accordance with Idaho Code § 46-1011(1).
