The improvements include frontage improvements, parking lot, and a pathway system within the park. 3. Use of Funds for Climate Action Planning

Ian will present ideas about solar panels for the Moscow School District

What makes a good location:

- South facing
- visible
- expandable
- newish roof and structurally sound.

Possible locations:

- Moscow Middle School cafeteria
- Moscow High School outdoor commons
- District Office
- Moscow Middle School concession shack.

There would be need an additional cost of \$2,500 per string for future installations.

Moscow Middle School cafeteria and district office are the top contenders.

Julia says since the school district doesn't pay taxes, she's not sure the Federal ITC savings would apply.

Other ideas to use the funds on are electric school buses and charging stations.

Ian says there was a request for two electric school buses and they are waiting for grant approval.

Julia asked if the City decided the City money should be sent on City building rather than the school.

Al moves to recommend to council for SEC to partnership with the School District on solar panel project, Victoria Seconds.

The committee recommends that the next step takes place in support of sponsoring solar panels.

Paul suggested offering community members be able to purchase a panel to help sponsor.

REPORTS

1. City Sustainability Report- Kelli Cooper

Latah County Fair this past weekend, talked about wisecapes with public.

This fall Kelli will start on water conservation plan updates.

Climate action plan finalized, going to council Oct 3rd.

Kelli started irrigation audits this past summer. Possibly offering an irrigation class in the spring.

PCEI will be offering a wisescape class this October.

Kelli is speaking at the climate walkout next week at the high school.
Kelli will also be speaking to the Rotary in November.

2. Moscow High School Subcommittee Report- Ian Schalter

On June 29th they presented to the school district asking to apply for the national electric school bus grant. They applied for two grants.

Late August Ian finished the solar panel project.

Sept 28th 1130-1 pm East City park walk- out in support of climate change.

3. Climate Action Working Group (CAWG)-Tina Hilding

Sophie sent Tina a website, sustainablecitycode.org, which has recommendations to what changes you could work to change in the city code. Removing barriers, creating incentives, filling regulatory gaps

Please join us for the 19th Annual Palouse Basin Water Summit on Tuesday, October 18th from 4:30 pm to 8:00 pm for this important annual community conversation about our Palouse Basin water supplies. Nationally recognized western water expert and award-winning author, Robert Glennon, will be featured at this year's event.

About Robert Glennon

The recipient of two National Science Foundation grants, Glennon serves as an advisor to governments, corporations, think tanks, law firms, and NGOs looking to solve serious challenges around water sustainability and planning. Glennon is a Regents Professor and Morris K. Udall Professor of Law and Public Policy in the Rogers College of Law at the University of Arizona. He received a J.D. from Boston College Law School and an M.A. and Ph.D. in American History from Brandeis University.

Glennon contributes regularly to national print media including the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post and Los Angeles Times. He is a sought-after speaker and analyst, helping reporters and the public understand current water policy and building a sustainable water future. His speaking schedule has taken him to more than 30 states as well as to Europe, Asia, Australia, and the Middle East.

Glennon contributes regularly to national print media including the New York Times and the Wall Street Journal. He has been a guest on *The Daily Show with Jon Stewart*, *Talk of the Nation* with Neal Conan, *The Diane Rehm Show*, C-SPAN2's *Book TV*, and numerous National Public Radio shows. He has been a commentator for American Public Media's *Marketplace*, and he was featured in the 2011 feature-length documentary *Last Call at the Oasis*. Robert Glennon is the author of ***Unquenchable: America's Water Crisis and What To Do About It***; ***Water Follies: Groundwater Pumping and the Fate of America's Fresh Waters***; and ***Shopping for Water: How the Market Can Mitigate Water Shortages in the American West***.

About the Summit

The Summit will also feature Palouse Basin Aquifer Committee Executive Director, Céline Acord, with the Annual State of the Basin report. Additionally, Dr. Robin Nimmer, Senior Hydrogeologist with Alta Science and Engineering, will discuss her recent work on identifying additional water supplies within the basin.

"We are incredibly grateful to have Robert Glennon joining us this year. Glennon's experience and insights around western water issues including water supplies and the challenges we face will be so timely as we look to develop additional water sources within the Palouse Basin," notes Jon Kimberling, Summit co-founder and Moscow businessman.
